Interim Final Rule - Electronic Fund Transfers (Regulation E)

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) has issued an interim final rule that replaces the Federal Reserve Board's (Fed) Regulation E which implements the Electronic Fund Transfer Act (EFTA). The interim final rule substantially duplicates the Fed's Regulation E as the CFPB's new Regulation E, 12 C.F.R. Part 1005, making only certain non-substantive, technical, formatting, and stylistic changes, and the CFPB notes that "this interim final rule does not impose any new substantive obligations on persons subject to existing Regulation E..."

To minimize any potential confusion, the CFPB is preserving the past numbering of the Fed's Regulation E. While the interim final rule generally incorporates the Fed's existing regulatory text, appendices (including model forms and clauses), and supplements, the rule has been edited as necessary to reflect technical changes, remove outdated provisions, and incorporate nomenclature as required by the Dodd-Frank Act.

The EFTA provides a basic framework that establishes the rights, liabilities, and responsibilities of participants in electronic fund transfer systems. The interim final rule does not cover the Fed's proposed international "remittance transfer" regulation that will be finalized by the CFPB at a later time. CUNA is reviewing the interim final rule to determine if there are any regulatory changes that could be made to Regulation E as it relates to credit unions. To the extent that we have such recommendations which could reduce the regulatory burden on credit unions, we will include these in our comment letter.
